“Emerging Issues in Biosafety” Spenger’s Fresh Fish Grotto—Berkeley, CA November 15, 2011

Bob Hashimoto, MS, RBP, CBSP, SM (NRCM) University of California, Berkeley

Bob Hashimoto is currently the Biosafety Officer at the University of California at Berkeley. He spent twelve years as a biosafety officer at the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA), the University of California at San Francisco (UCSF) and Stanford University where he was a member of the Institutional Biosafety Committee (IBC), the Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC) and the Institutional Review Board (IRB). He also served as the Biosafety Officer at Genentech, Inc., where he specialized in issues involving large scale production and manufacturing.

Bob received his B.S and M.S. degrees in Biology from the University of San Francisco. He is certified through the American Society for Microbiology (ASM) as a Specialist Microbiologist in Biological Safety and as a Certified Biosafety Professional (CBSP) through the American Biological Safety Association (ABSA). He has presented numerous papers on biosafety at the ABSA National meeting, the Campus Safety Association National meeting (CSHEMA), the Massachusetts Society for Medical Research (MSMR) meeting, the Laboratory Safety and Environmental Management (LSEM) meeting and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Biosafety Symposium. He has also taught pre-conference courses in human gene therapy, bioterrorism and risk management. In 2008, Bob received the American Biological Safety Association’s Everett J. Hanel Jr. Presidential Award for career contributions to the profession of biosafety.

Mr. Hashimoto will speak on emerging issues in biosafety including but not limited to proposed changes in the Select Agent Standard and the National Institutes of Health (NIH) Guidelines for the Use of Recombinant DNA Molecules. He will also discuss application of the State of California’s Airborne Transmissible Disease Standard, 8 CCR 5199 and the update of the biohazards section of the American Industrial Hygiene Association’s revised book of workplace hazards.

President's Message

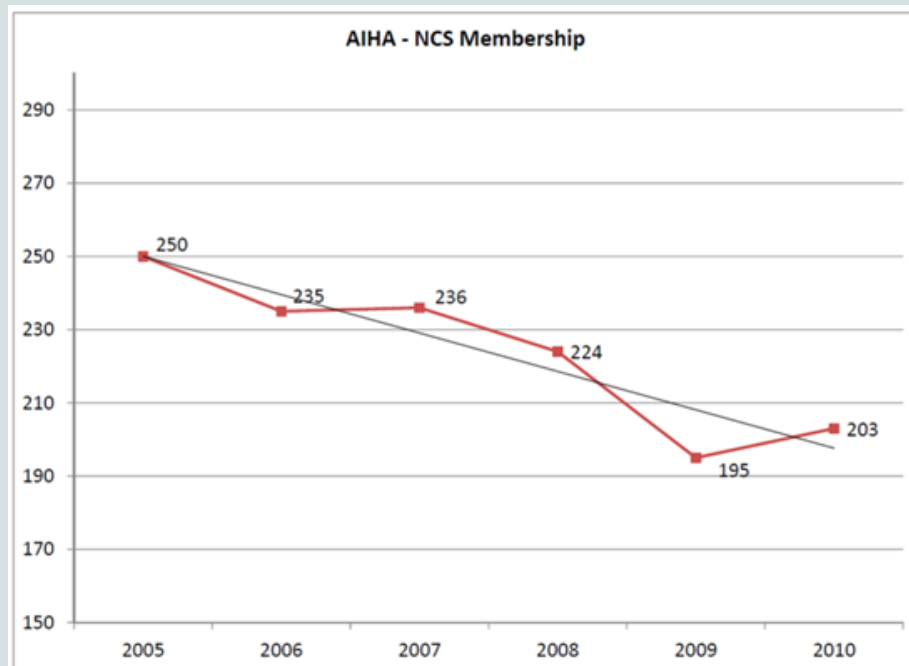

DWOI Update

Most mornings I listen to KQED, but lately I've found myself turning the knob to a music station. High unemployment rates, stock markets in tumble, government austerity measures; the news depresses me. The music gives me a moment to ignore the world and its vast, numerous problems. As the day rolls on though, I realize I can't just ignore my responsibility (*our* responsibility) to improve the world. My volunteer activities with DWOI allow me to feel like I'm tangibly affecting and improving the world. Lately DWOI has been doing a lot, with the help of our generous AIHA-NCS member volunteers. Here are just some of the things we've done over the summer.

DWOI Sponsors Training in Indonesia and China

One of DWOI's main functions is to build OHS capacity in developing countries by supporting the training of workers and OHS organizers. In July, DWOI supported a one-day training in Tangerang, Indonesia (west of Jakarta). For the nearly 30 people from five plant-level unions, this was their first OHS training. The training was organized by our contact Darisman Man and two local organizations: the Local Initiative for OSH Network (LION) Indonesia and the Indonesian-Workers Union Federation.

The theme of this training was "The Impact of Global Trade on Employment Conditions." The training aimed at helping these union employees start to recognize the potential occupational safety and health hazards in their workplaces. By all accounts the training was a success and DWOI hopes to continue to fund these types of trainings.

DWOI Ships More Books to Africa and Asia

DWOI continues to send your OHS textbooks to Africa and Asia. In the past year we've doubled our inventory of books, thanks to your donations of over 200 books. Our sincere thanks to Terese Hagerty and Yvette Brittain from SCIF for donating a large collection of excellent reference books. Thanks also to our newest DWOI recruits, Nisha Parikh, Alexandra Rodionova, and Stanley Wu who helped catalog these books into our inventory.

This summer we've sent out shipments to South Africa, Kenya, and Indonesia. One of the recipients, Anton Ojong, and his team at the Pertamina Hulu Energi in Jakarta Timur, Indonesia had this to say: "Thanks for you and DWOI ... Our plan with books; to add our knowledge (source and solution) in indoor air quality at office and fields. From films: to increase knowledge in food safety (for doctors and food handlers)."

DWOI Gets Published

One of Rich Hirsh's goals for DWOI is to promote the spawning of DWOI-like groups across other AIHA local sections. For this purpose, to promote DWOI and AIHA-NCS, and gather potential future partners, Rich wrote an article for the August 2011 African Newsletter on Occupational Health and Safety. She was the guest speaker to the class that is composed of industrial, chemical and human factors engineering students.



Vapor Intrusion: An Update & Case Studies for the Industrial Hygienist September 13, 2011 Dinner Meeting Summary

Our September dinner meeting was generously sponsored by Analytical Sciences, LLC, a California Department of Health Services certified laboratory specializing in environmental testing and analytical chemistry. David Krack, our Local Section President, provided the dinner meeting attendees with an update on the annual Board Planning Meeting. David also presented Service Awards to recognize the volunteers who have helped the Local Section with their outstanding services in the past year.

The guest speaker at the dinner meeting was Patricia Beach, a Past-President and current Government Affairs Representative of the Local Section. Patty, Managing Partner with Harris & Lee Environmental Sciences, LLC, an environmental and occupational health and safety consulting firm in Northern California, gave a brief overview on what vapor intrusion is, and regulatory frameworks and screening levels pertaining to vapor intrusion.

As defined by the Environmental Protection Agency, vapor intrusion is the migration of volatile organic or inorganic compounds into occupied buildings from underlying contaminated groundwater or soil. Contaminant exposure via gas and vapor intrusion could pose a significant risk to the public. Regulatory frameworks pertaining to vapor intrusion have generally been at the state and federal level. Health-based screening levels are typically referenced when evaluating vapor intrusion data; however, these screening levels are not the same as permissible exposure limits (PELs). PELs are established differently from the health-based screening levels, and while PELs are enforceable, the screening levels are not. Also, PELs are typically greater than the screening levels.

Due to the low detection limits required for vapor intrusion investigations, the sampling methods are typically different from those used for workplace exposure sampling. Patty provided three case studies to give the audience a deeper insight into the types of vapor intrusion investigations that can occur and the sample results that have been collected during those investigations.

Annual CIHC Board Overview

Mission:

- Founded in 1990 to establish a legislative presence in CA state capitol for IH profession.
- Keeps profession intact by opposing further erosion or limitation of practice by legislation or regulation. Seeks recognition in statute defining, recognizing, and protecting the profession of industrial hygiene. Sponsors legislation.
- Provides sound scientific and technological input to the legislative and regulatory process. Works with national AIHA Governmental Affairs and other professional organizations when legislation/regulations impact California workers and the public.
- Formed by the five CA local sections of AIHA. Local sections include—Northern California, Sacramento, San Diego, Orange County and Southern CA. Designated as the AIHA State Governmental Affairs Organization in CA.
- Contracts with Sacramento Advocacy, a Sacramento based legislative advocacy firm to provide legislative support.

Representation:

- Ten official Board members (all volunteers), two from each local section. Several local sections also have an alternate representative (a 3rd rep) as backup.
- The CIHC also has non-Board designated scientific advisors on select topics. The Board meets 3-4 x/year, with conference calls in between the meetings for select issues.
- CIHC’s strategic mission and deliverables reviewed & adjusted annually with local sections.

Deliverables:

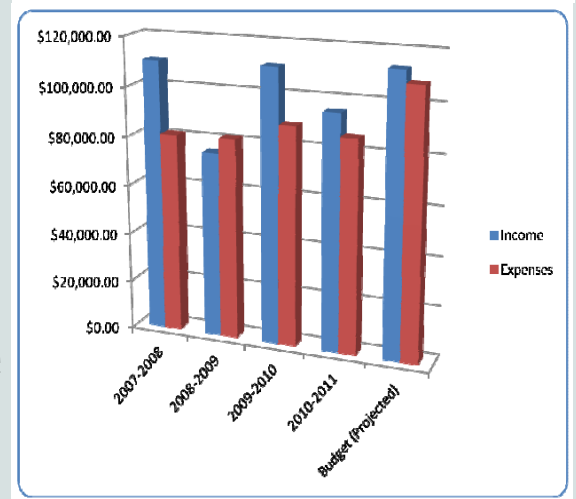
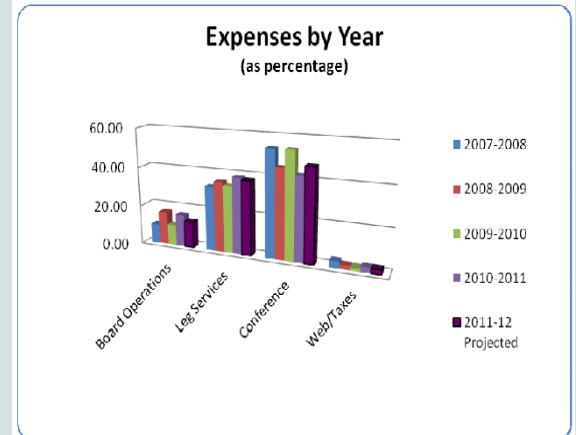
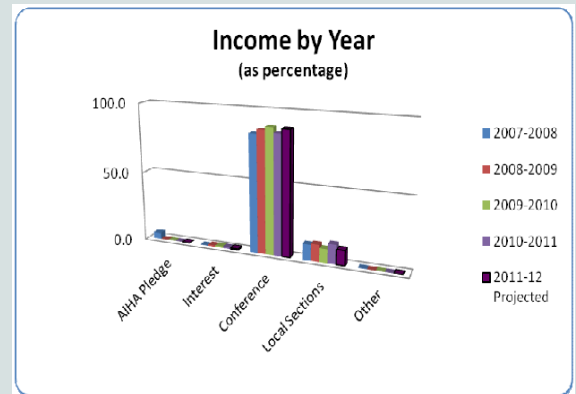
- Legislative Services (sound scientific & technological input to legislative & regulatory process.
- Coordination with national AIHA Governmental Affairs on broader EHS issues/ initiatives.
- Annual CIHC Conference, rotated between northern and southern California.
- Interface with allied health professional organizations to coordinate regional EHS conferences, make presentations on select occupational health topics, and coordinate work effort on selected topics where appropriate.
- Occupational health representation on Cal-OSHA Advisory Committee.
- Representation on Cal-OSHA PEL HEAC and FAC Committees.
- Representation on Cal-OSHA designated technical advisory committees.
- Periodic newsletter submittals (about legislative/regulatory activities and other CIHC activities) to AIHA California local sections; submittals to national AIHA Governmental Affairs.
- Briefings of legislators on topics affecting the industrial hygiene profession
- CIHC website with professional linkages, CIHC overview, mission, submittals, conference presentations, formal submittals to legislative and regulatory bodies.

Finances:

CIHC has fluctuated between being in the red and black over the course of its history. Its reserves today are adequate to address conference costs and key initiative legislative activity. Although CIHC activities and involvement have increased dramatically, CIHC has been successful in not requiring a change its local section assessment since 1990. It is anticipated that 2012 costs will dramatically increase due to legislative activities. CIHC’s next meeting is scheduled for Monday evening, December 5, 2011.
